Course information

Content 1

The Art History 3A lessons deal with subjects from a broad area of contemporary fine art and art theory. In some cases, the boundaries between different areas of fine art can no longer be clearly drawn. Based on several examples, we discuss the developments in these areas. We study how and why boundaries are crossed. Which visual strategies have been developed and by whom? Which principles, processes and criteria have been chosen?

Using visual material (slides, videos, music) and texts that have been written by visual artists about their work and by art theorists, we search for the views underlying the artworks and projects discussed, whereby we also address the exchange of ideas and mutual influences between visual artists, and areas of research.

You are expected to visit exhibitions, expositions, museums and galleries, and to contribute your experiences.

On the basis of the meetings, you develop and formulate a problem in the area of art theory. You set this down in writing and begin literature research into this problem. Finally, you draw up an outline of your research plan on paper.

- 2. to relate your insights (into art theory approaches) to your own points of view and ways of working;
- 3. to set up research into the way in which art sources from past and present (visual, textual and musical sources) can be used as sites for new ideas, which correspond to your own previously existing interests and can therefore enrich your own vision (and may serve as the starting point for new developments in your art work);
- 4. to put your own observations or hypotheses into words and to place your own insights within the context of art theory and art history.

At the end of this module, you will have:

- 1. formulated a problem in the field of contemporary art theory;
- 2. started literature research;
- 3. formulated a research plan;
- 4. visited various exhibitions and expositions.
